Beecher Community Calendar Gets Major Upgrade!

The Beecher Community Calendar App recently received a major upgrade. Not only does the app still show all the activities that are going on within our local community, including free community events plus meeting dates and activities planned by the township, library, village, fire district and school, it now offers a **“Local News Feed”**.

The newsfeed feature was added when developer Chris Russell was asked by his wife if there was a way to get news from her hometown after the local paper went out of business. Chris sprang into action and developed an AI driven platform that scans local online newsfeeds and pulls them into the news portion of the app. The newsfeed includes information that has always been available to the public, including summaries of any local taxing entity that has posted their minutes online as well as press releases and other related local topics. Currently the newsfeed offers info from Washington Township, Beecher Library District, Village of Beecher, Beecher Police Department, Beecher Fire Protection District and the Beecher School District 200U. Don't miss out on what is going on with your local entities, it's all in one place. No longer do you need to go to different websites or scan Facebook, just open our app. The app also contains a tab that pulls information from Will County in the same manner. What are your county officials discussing or voting on? It's on the app.

Parents, another great feature of the App is it includes the school sports and other activities listed on their calendar. The application takes the information from the school website and downloads it into our app. Need to know when the next game is, early dismissal, end of the quarter, or “no school”? Just open the appropriate (BES, BJHS, BHS) school calendar.

To get all this information for **FREE**, just go to your favorite app store and type in **Beecher Community Calendar** and tap on **download!**

From Supervisor Mike Stanula

Hello Friends and Neighbors-

I hope you all enjoyed your summer, and I wish you nothing but health and happiness as we approach the change of seasons and the end of another year. Please read through this issue of your Townships Fall newsletter where you will find facts and events that you and your family would surely enjoy. We are looking into things that will bring us closer together, encourage health and happiness and foster community spirit and pride.

Friends, I am going to jump on my soap box just for a moment and once again speak about these Mega Solar Sites. The Township received notice of another solar site coming to Washington Township. This one will be off Corning Road adjacent to the current solar site which was built a few years ago. According to my count this would be 5 solar sites (present and future). Washington Township has been against these projects since the beginning, each time addressing the County and the Developers of our opinion. Here is an excerpt of the letter sent by the township concerning a Solar Site on the north side of Beecher.....

“We do not recommend the Zoning request nor the Special Use Variances for a Solar Farm. We are familiar with so called “Solar Farms”. They continue to scar the landscape, replacing farmland which benefits our residents both regionally as well as nationally. Solar Farms benefit a select few and provide large profits to the developers. The long-term effects of solar farms have yet to be seen. The present effects we do know of include migratory bird and wildlife disruption, loss of crop land and unnatural soil warming. Many components of the solar panels are also not recyclable once the life cycle of the equipment has ended. The longevity of the start-up solar developers to provide long term service and restoration of the property back to original ground is yet to be seen. Solar Farm developers believe that if they put their projects out in the country no one will notice. We as a township do indeed notice, however we have our hands tied, due to state legislation, which limits our control over wind and solar energy projects, the best that we can do is to state our point of view and make recommendations. The Siciliano Community Solar Garden (is not a garden)”

Solar developers typically give financial rewards to local agencies as a way of softening the impact as if to say ‘it’s ok that we are destroying your farmland because we gave you something to forget about what we are doing’.

Washington Township will not participate in this type of Quid quo pro.

Please let’s keep Beecher a Great place to be!

Washington Township Food Pantry Asking for Help / Holiday Schedule

As the Thanksgiving holiday approaches, the food pantry is planning on supplying a holiday breakfast and dinner to those people in need. We are fortunate that we will have turkeys, eggs, cranberries and canned vegetables available, however, we are asking for canned fruit (peaches, mixed, etc.), butter, instant potatoes, bread (please bring on Nov 24) and frozen orange juice. If you are willing to donate any of these items, please bring them to the Washington Township Center no later than November 19. All we ask is that these items have not reached their expiration date.

The Food Pantry also accepts cash donation that will be used to purchase items as necessary. Cash donations can be dropped off at the Washington Township Center during regular business hours and we will provide you with a receipt.

From Assessor Pat Peters: Tax Exemptions You May Be Entitled To!

If you are a homeowner, senior citizen, veteran, disabled veteran, or disabled person, you might be eligible for a money-saving exemption. The Supervisor of Assessments is responsible for administering the following exemptions:

General Homestead Exemption

Homestead property (residential property that is occupied by its owner as his/her principal dwelling place) is entitled to an annual homestead exemption of **\$8,000** off the assessed value. If your tax bill is missing the General Homestead Exemption, please contact your local Township Assessor.

Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption (PTAX- 324)

The Senior's Homestead property is entitled to an annual exemption of **\$8,000** off your assessed value. This is in addition to the General Homestead Exemption and any other applicable exemptions. To qualify, you must be 65 years of age or older during the assessment year, own or have legal or equitable interest in the property occupied as your principal residence during the assessment year and be liable for payment of the property taxes. To file for a Senior Citizens Homestead Exemption, you need:

- A copy of your Illinois driver's license OR Illinois State ID OR birth certificate
- A copy of your current Tax Bill OR your P.I.N. (property index number)



Disabled Persons' Homestead Exemption (PTAX- 343)

The Disabled Persons' Homestead Exemption is entitled to an annual exemption of \$2,000 off the assessed value. This is in addition to the General Homestead Exemption and any other applicable exemptions. To qualify, you must be disabled or become disabled during the assessment year, own or have legal or equitable interest in the property or a lease-hold interest of a single-family residence, occupy the property as your principal place of residence on January 1st of the assessment year, and be liable for payment of the property taxes. Check with the Assessor's Office for eligibility requirements.

Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze Homestead Exemption (PTAX- 340)

Allows qualified senior citizens to have their home's equalized assessed value (EAV) "frozen" at the base year value and prevents increases due to inflation. (The tax rate is not frozen.) This exemption would be in addition to the General Homestead Exemption and any other applicable exemptions. To qualify you must be 65 or older in 2025; your total household income was \$65,000 or less and you used the property as your principal place of residence; you own or have legal or equitable interest in the property or a leasehold interest in the property used as a single-family residence; and you are liable for the payment of property taxes. You do not qualify for this exemption if your property is assessed under the mobile home privilege tax. To file for a Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze Homestead Exemption, you will need to use the front page of your IRS 1040 and your Social Security 1099 while completing the application. If you did not file an IRS 1040, use the Social Security 1099 and ALL other household income verification.

Disabled Veterans' Homestead Exemption (PTAX- 342)

Provides an annual reduction in the equalized assessed value (EAV) of the primary residence occupied by a disabled veteran on January 1st of the assessment year or on a prorated basis during the time of occupancy for the assessment year. This is in addition to the General Homestead Exemption and any other applicable exemptions. A veteran with 70% -100% service-connected disability will receive an annual decrease in their assessed value to Zero (0), when the EAV is \$250,000 or less. A veteran with 50%-60% service-connected disability will receive an annual \$5,000 reduction off the assessed value. A Veteran with 30%-40% service-connected disability will receive an annual \$2,500 reduction off the assessed value. To qualify you must be an Illinois resident who has served as a member of U.S. Armed Forces on active duty or state active duty, Illinois National Guard, or U.S. Reserve Forces, and not dishonorably discharged. Check with the Assessor's Office for eligibility requirements.

Returning Veterans' Homestead Exemption (PTAX- 341)

The Returning Veteran's Homestead Exemption provides a \$5,000 reduction off the assessed value of the veteran's principal residence for two consecutive assessment (tax) years, the tax year and the following year that the veteran returns from active duty in an armed conflict involving the armed forces of the United States. The veteran must own and occupy the property as his or her principal residence on January 1 of each assessment year. This is in addition to the General Homestead Exemption and any other applicable exemptions. Check with the Assessor's Office for eligibility requirements.

The Washington Township Board recently decided to go back to a five day a week schedule after testing a “Summer Hours” schedule at the Washington Township Center. The office is once again open Monday – Friday from 9 AM to 3 PM. There was no change made to the township’s Dial-A-Ride program that continues to run on Mondays and Thursdays.

Additionally, the township has hired two new part-time employees, who will split their time in the office to ensure there is coverage every day. Teresa Peterson will work exclusively in the office and will be working on the days that the Dial-A-Ride is running. Teresa worked in the office several years ago and is well versed in township activities. Melanie Brenenstall will be driving the Dial-A-Ride bus, handling the transportation responsibilities and daily office activities when not driving. Melanie is from Beecher and has worked with the public for many years. We are excited to have Teresa and Melanie on board!

The new staff was hired when long-time employee Tammy Hitzelburger decided to take a new position elsewhere. Tammy was a loyal and dedicated employee, and we wish her the best as she starts her new career path!

Community Building News

The Washington Township Community Hall Board of Directors welcomed Robert Pagani to the open position on the Board following the recent elections. Bob has been a resident of the township for many years and is very familiar with the Community Hall through his work with the Beecher Part-Time Players. Bob is also a certified electrician. We also accepted the resignation of Stacy Mazurek from the Board in September. We want to thank Stacy for her years of service and dedication to the Board and wish her all the best in her new endeavors.

As often happens in the upkeep and management of older buildings (the Community Hall was built in 1929) we have had to adjust some of our plans for future improvements. Work still continues on a new digital sign in front of the building so that newer residents and visitors can more easily find the Community Hall. We will also be placing it out for bid to have the HVAC system replaced. After more than 25 years of service and continual issues with keeping all of the units operating, as well as changes in the HVAC industry making repairs of the current units more difficult, the decision was made to replace the system so that both the Heating and Cooling of the building will be more reliable.

The Hall continues to accept applications for rent from any Washington Township resident. It is a great location for birthday parties, baby showers, bridal showers, graduation parties and much more! The standard fee is \$125 per day per level. Don't Let Lint Start a Fire in Your Home

At the Beecher Fire Protection District, your safety is our top priority. One of the most overlooked — yet highly preventable — causes of residential fires is something many of us use daily: the clothes dryer.

Each year, thousands of home fires across the United States are caused by dryers. The leading cause? Failure to clean the dryer and its vent system. Lint buildup, restricted airflow, and improper venting can all create a serious fire hazard. We want to help you protect your home and loved ones with a few important safety reminders.

Why Dryer Vent Cleaning Matters

As your dryer runs, it produces heat and collects lint. While the lint trap captures some of it, a significant amount escapes into the vent hose and ductwork. Over time, this buildup can block airflow, overheat your appliance, and potentially ignite. Dryer fires often start quietly — behind walls or in concealed ductwork — and can spread quickly before you're even aware something is wrong.

Warning Signs Your Dryer Vent May Be Clogged

These are red flags that airflow is restricted — and your risk of a fire is increasing. If you notice any of the following, it's time to take action:

- Clothes are taking longer to dry than usual
- The dryer feels hot to the touch or shuts off unexpectedly
- A musty or burning smell is present during or after drying
- Lint is collecting around the dryer or outside vent
- The exterior vent flap doesn't open properly when the dryer is running



Dryer Vent Safety Tips

Protect your home by following these best practices:

- Clean the lint trap before and after every load
- Inspect and clean your dryer vent system at least once a year — more often if you have a large family or pets
- Use rigid or semi-rigid metal ducts — avoid plastic or foil vent hoses, which can sag and trap lint
- Ensure the outside vent is clear of obstructions, such as leaves, nests, or snow
- Don't leave the dryer running when you leave the house or go to sleep
- Schedule professional cleaning if your vents are long, hard to reach, or haven't been cleaned in years

Professional Cleaning Can Make a Big Difference

For homes with long vent systems or complicated ductwork, a professional dryer vent cleaning service can remove years of lint buildup and ensure everything is properly connected and exhausting outside.

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Beecher Chamber of Commerce News!

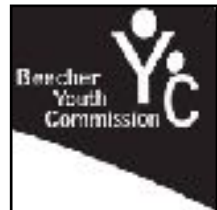

Washington Township Road District News

The Washington Township Road District continues to make road improvements! The road district has tar and chipped 13 miles of roads in 2025 and have upgraded more than 30 miles of township roads since 2023! With over 70 miles of roads in Washington Township, the Road District has addressed 40% of the roads.

There was also 1 mile of new asphalt put down. Funds to pave roads is received from the counties "Motor Fuel Tax" and at over \$17,000 to pave one mile, Commissioner Smith works diligently to ensure the repairs go where they are needed most. These repairs can be attributed to good planning, favorable weather and joining forces with other local townships to maximize equipment and labor. This practice has been beneficial for all the involved townships as it enables all of them to get more accomplished each summer.

There were also multiple culverts replaced, mowing, tree trimming and installation and replacement of signs throughout the township. The department has recently begun the final mowing of roadside ditches this fall to ensure snow doesn't pile up and drift across roads this winter.

Congratulations to Commissioner Mike Smith and his dedicated Crew for a job well done!

Washington Township Medical Closet
